Student Council representatives were: Kenneth Marshall and Robert Mercer. Eugene Giziewski was president of the Student Council.

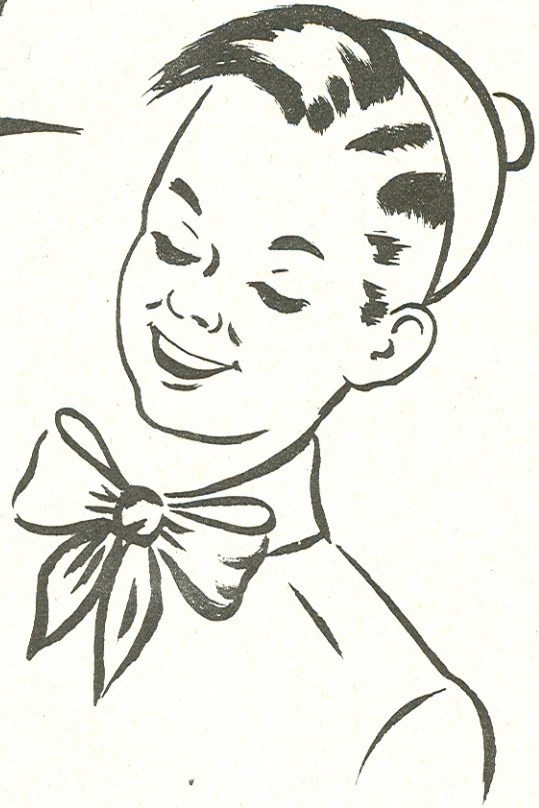
Of the class of 13 members only two, Luther Big Eagle and Joyce Furlow have completed the twelve years together.

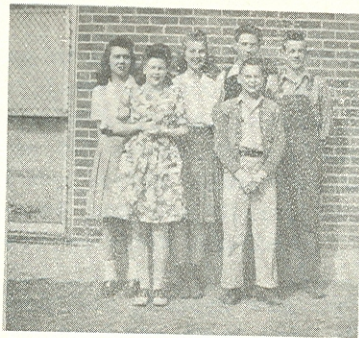

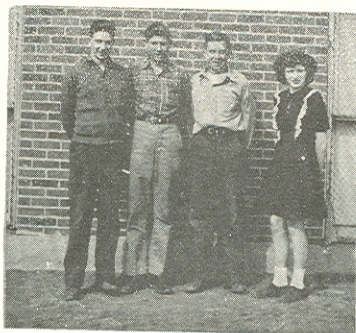

The last game of the season was played with Harrold on their floor February 12th. The score was 15-8 in our favor.

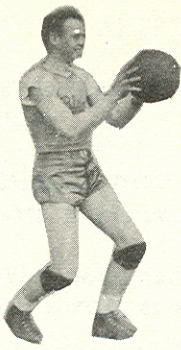
During the Basketball season the Blunt Girls made 256 points to their opponents 176, averaging 22 points a game.

High point player for the year was Ramona Big Eagle with 122 points. Norma Osterkamp was second with 86 points, while Joyce Furlow made 71.

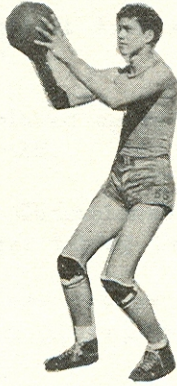
Blunt had a very successful year playing twelve games and only losing one. This was due to the co-operation of the girls and the coaching of Mrs. Anna Sessions.
