

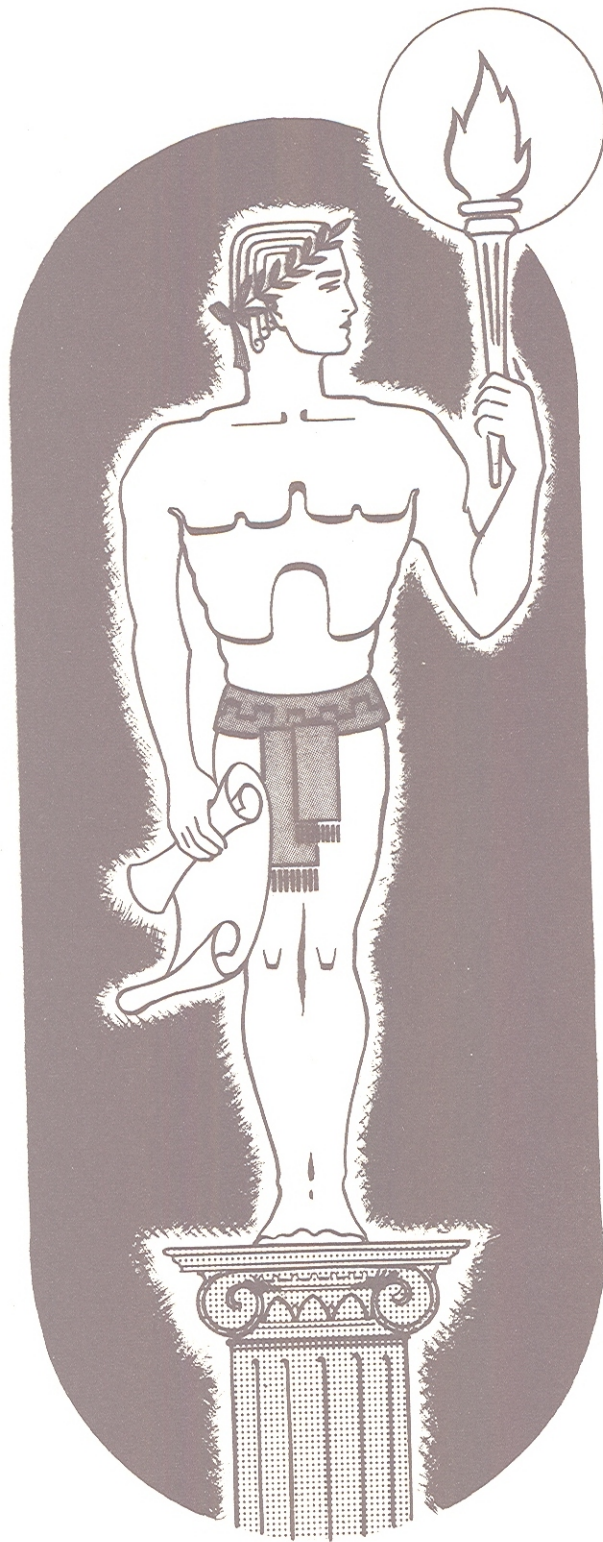

DEDICATION

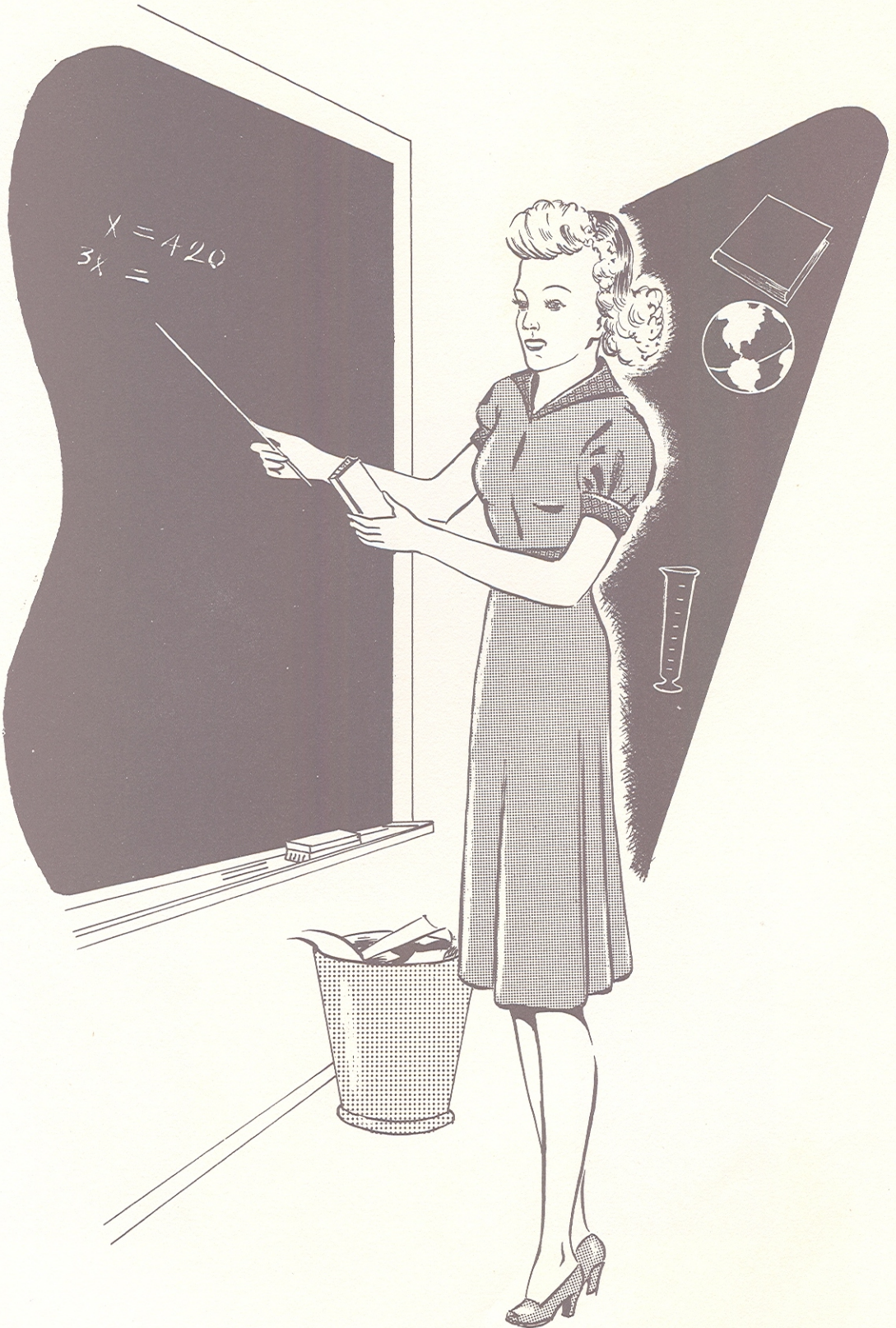
We the Senior Class of 1947 do hereby dedicate this annual as the last and perhaps greatest work of our High School career:

## SENIOR CLASS PROPHECY

1947 brings to a close another successful year for the Blunt Bluebirds, having lost one game out of ten and coming to a draw on another.

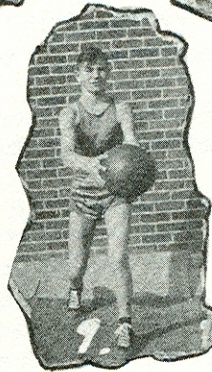
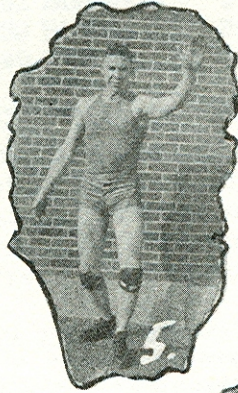
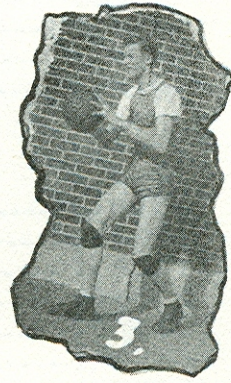
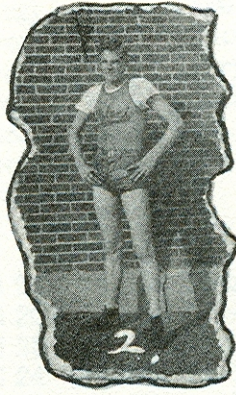

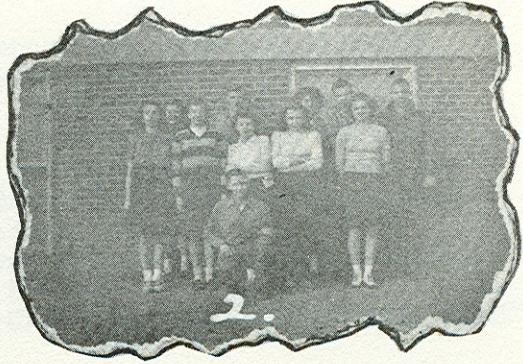
Although a seeming unsuccessful season the Monarchs can however boast of being the team playing the most games in the conference.
