As we got further on our journey, we all got to be better travelers and more used to seeing the country (books), and cities (teachers).

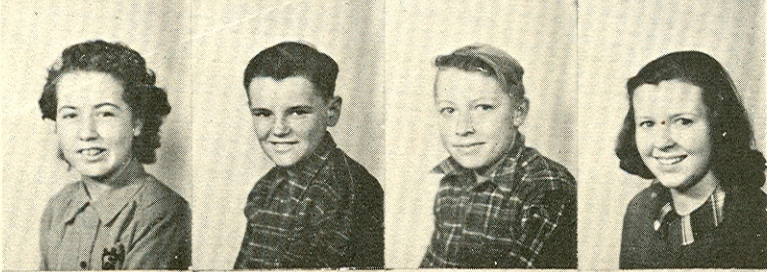
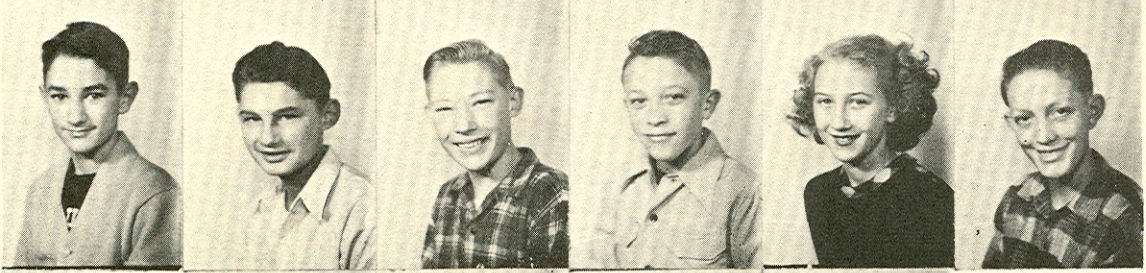
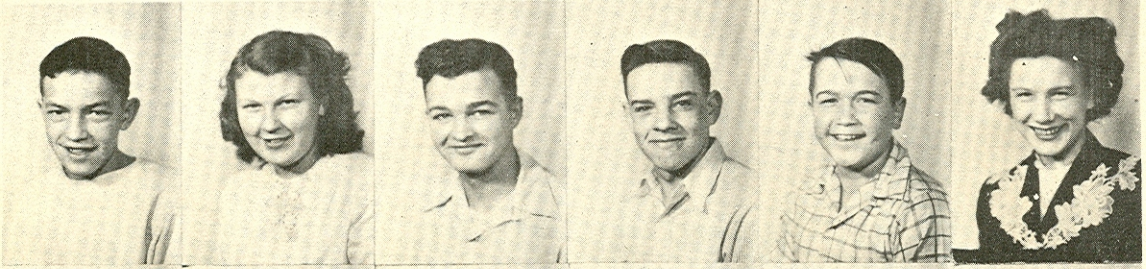
Just as we were having fun, we had to stop at the city called Semester Test. This city showed Carol and Evonne as the best survivors with their names appearing on the city honor roll.

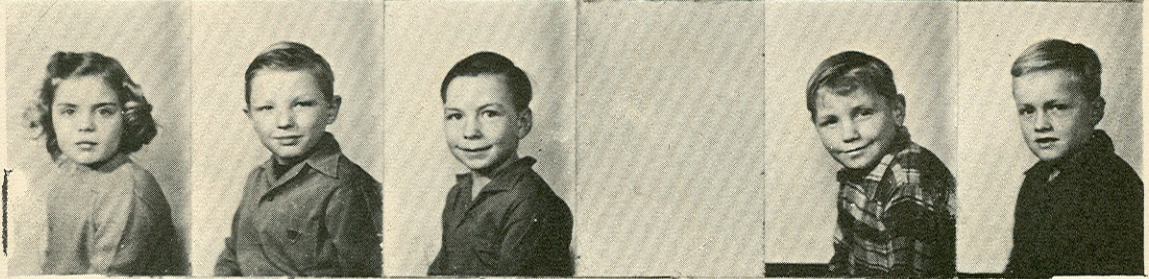
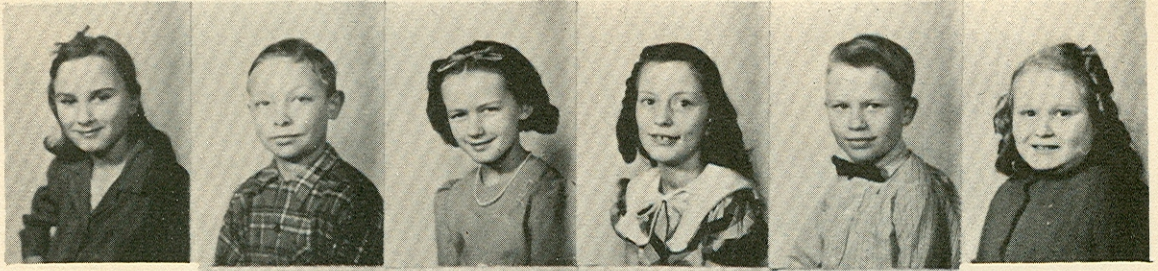
The group hopes it all survives up to and through the city, Final Test. If we do, we hope to continue our journey next year through Sophomore State.

BLUNT MONARCHS

Blunt Monarchs started their basketball season of '48 and '49 with ten men; four Seniors; LaVerne Nye, LeRoy Nye, Jerry Gunsalus, and Derwood Mercer, three Juniors; Warren Melvin, Bob Sevening, and Charles Ogan, one Sophomore; Harold Welch and two eight graders; Buddy Welch, and Richard Kirsch. There were also some boys from grade school and high school that were just starting in and did not make the first ten.

Bob Sevening was high point man for the season with a total of 359 points, LaVerne was next with 174 points, Warren helped out with 157, Derwood 135, LeRoy 67, Charles 32, Harold 19, Buddy 11, Richard 10, Jerry 5, to make a total of 970 points while our opponents made 1031 points.

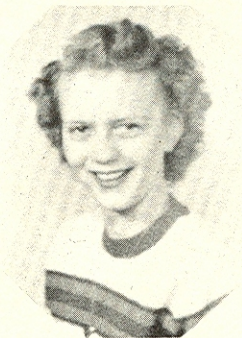

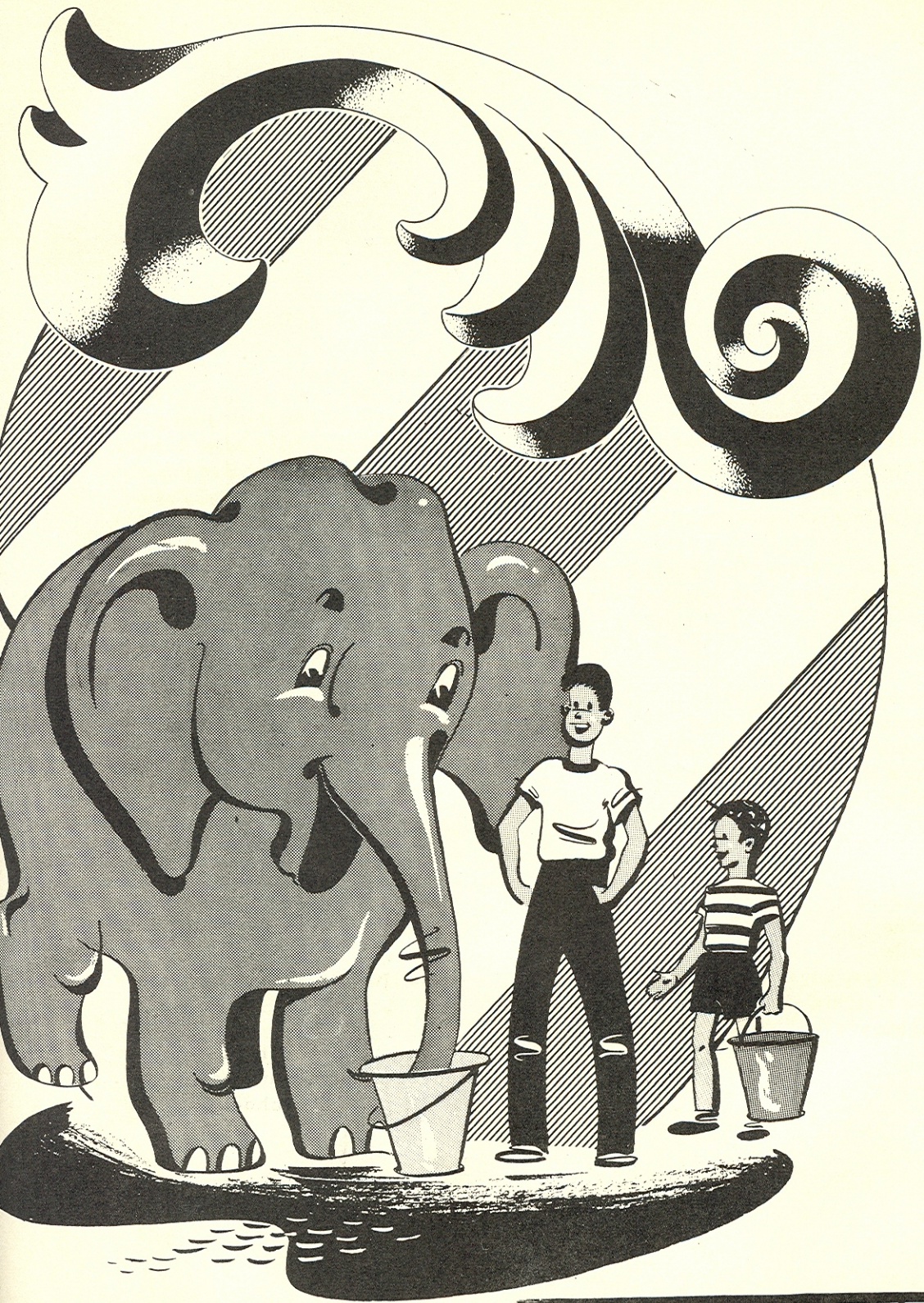

The triple trio sang Barber Shop Harmony and Beg Your Pardon.

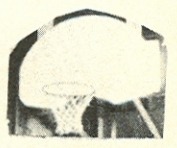
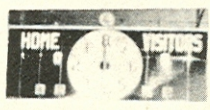
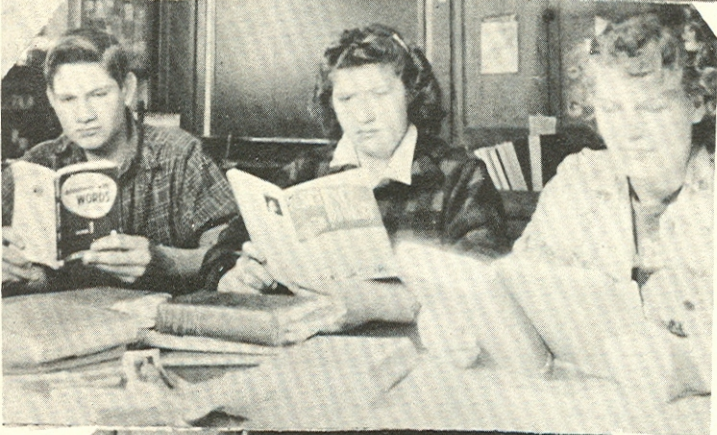
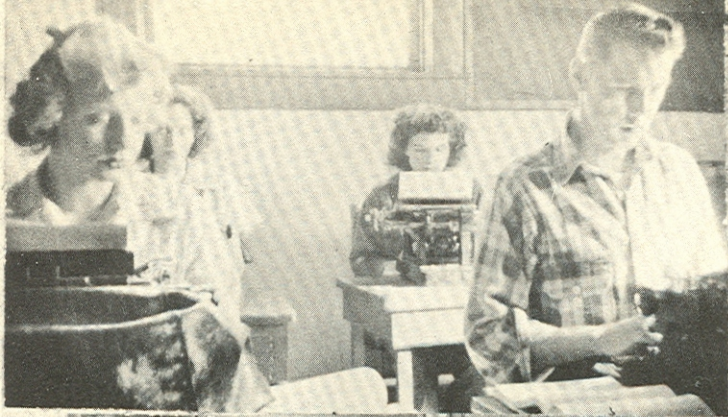
