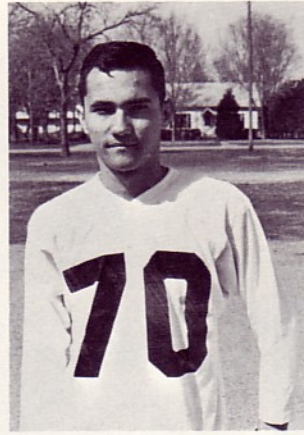

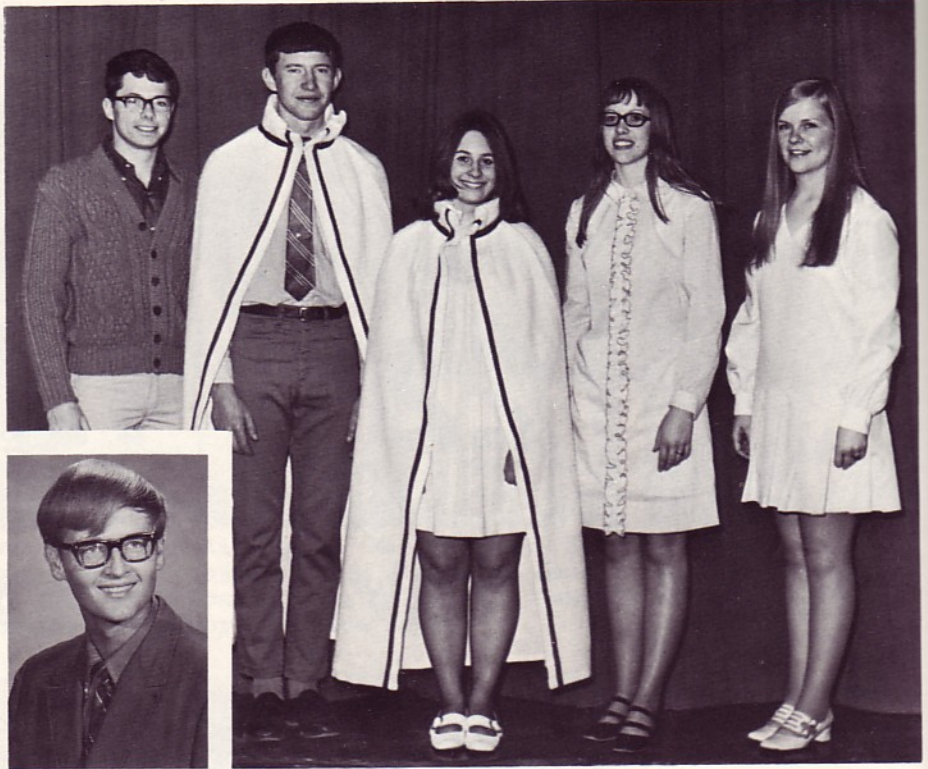

# Homecoming

A very special two days it was, that Thursday and Friday in October---the very first Blunt High homecoming. Reigning over the event were the seniors chosen by the student body and pictured at the right: Rick Walker (inset), Harry Kimbley, King Ted Massey, Queen Carlotta Albright, Sandra Small, and Sharon Metzinger. It took a month of planning by a committee of 16 students, but Homecoming 1969 was just perfect.



"And the homecoming queen is-----Carlotta Albright!" Her reaction was predictable, as shown above. The coronation concluded a variety show of music, skits, and dancing. Denise Marshall, Sharon Harkless, and Cookie Boyles (and others) wowed the audience with "Hey, Big Spender!" The freshmen had spent the week preparing the bonfire. After the snake dance led by King Ted and Queen Carlotta, the pep rally around the fire featured speeches by the royalty, players, and fans, (lower right). With school spirit a mile high, a coffee hour concluded the first day's events.





## Homecoming

Honking horns, happy shouts, and the pealing of the "victory bell" signalled the end of BHS's first homecoming. The spirit generated the night before carried over into Friday when the Monarchs burned Wood 34-14 in cold weather that nobody seemed to notice. Most of the morning was spent in decorating the field---streamers on the goalposts, the U. S. flag high atop the baseball backstop, and benches for the visiting Onida band---and stirring up school spirit by means of a P. A. system on a pickup driven by Les Sevening. An outhouse helped in the spirit department; the structure placed on a pickup led the team from the dressing room to the field accompanied by a carload of cheerleaders and drums. Prior to the game Queen Carlotta presented the game ball at midfield to the six senior co-captains. Then it was football time and what fun! King Ted Massey (picture at right) caught seven of Sevening's passes and led the defense, which held Wood to 16 net yards rushing. Sevening (11) ran up 163 yards alone and passed for 121 yards, scoring four TD's and passing for the fifth. Rich Doyle (22) received a handoff (lower right) from Sevening for a big gain setting up one of the scores.

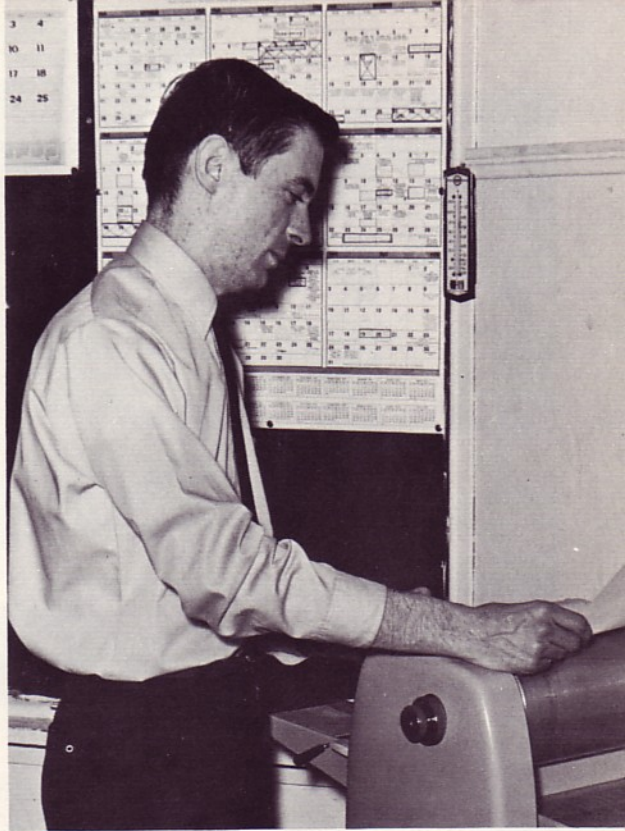


NICK DeBILZAN was Blunt High's guidance counselor for the third year. He also served high schools in Murdo, Ft. Pierre, and Onida in this capacity.

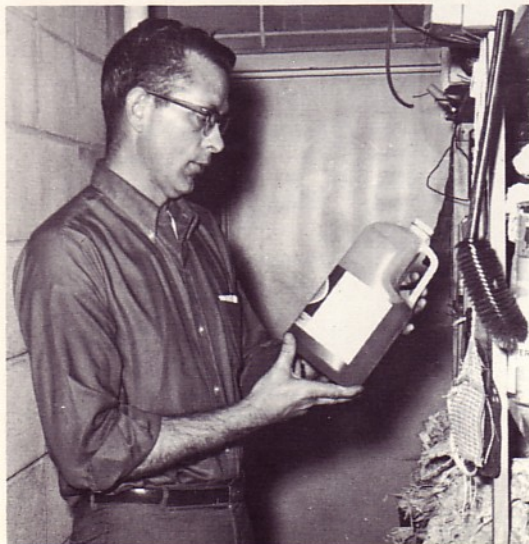

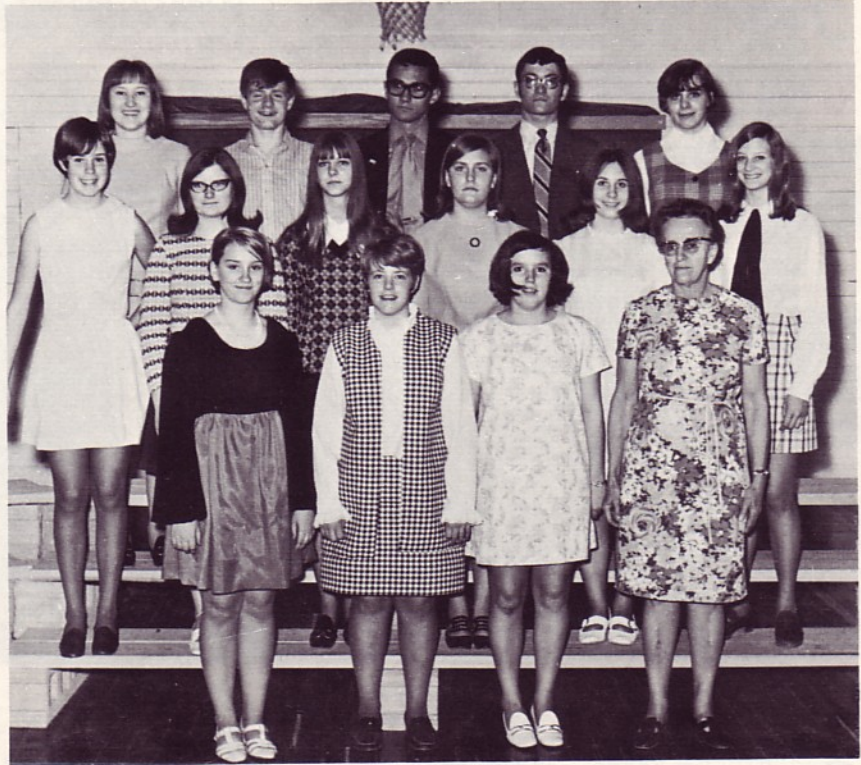

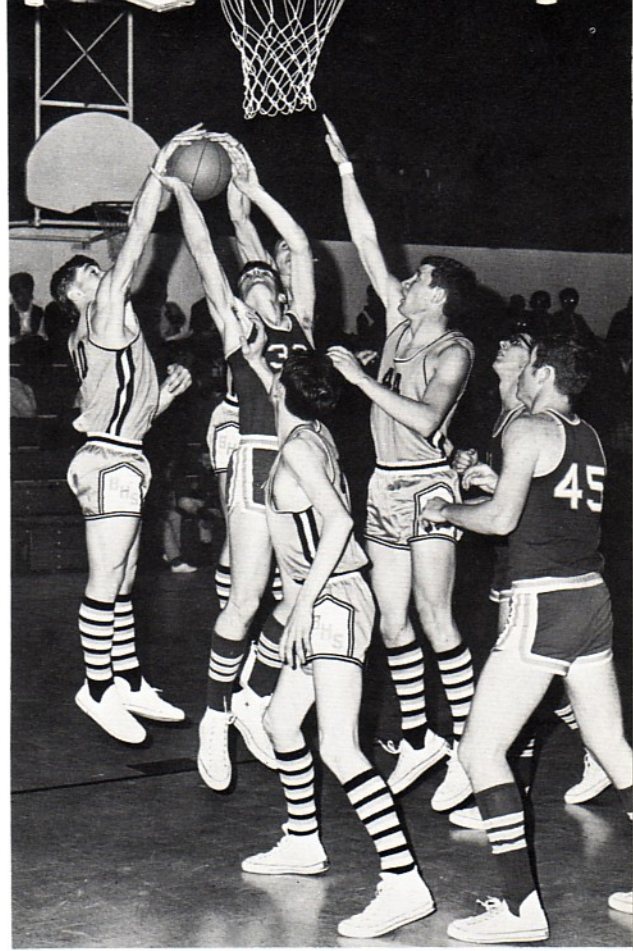
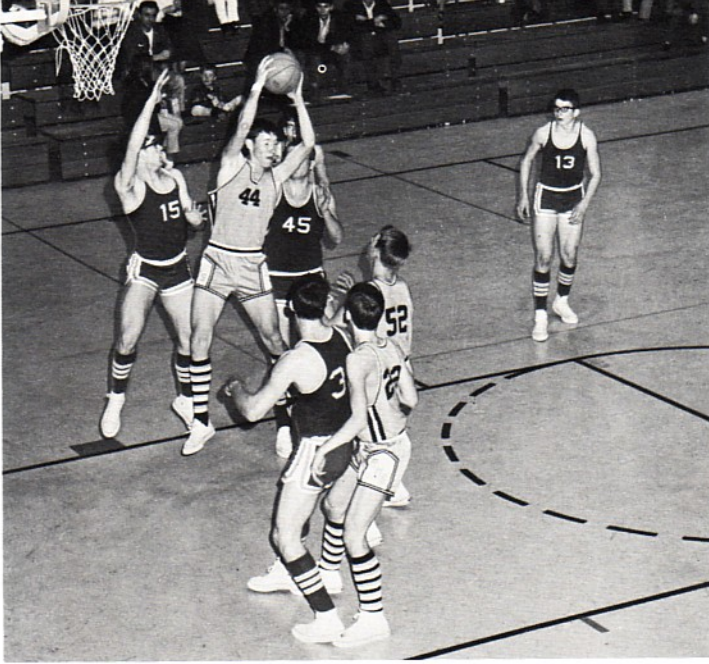
The lady behind the desk in the fourth grade room this year was Mrs. Thelma King. She also taught some third grade sub-jects.

In her first year as a full-time member of the Blunt faculty was Mrs. Opal Sprague. She held the posi-tion of fifth grade instructor.



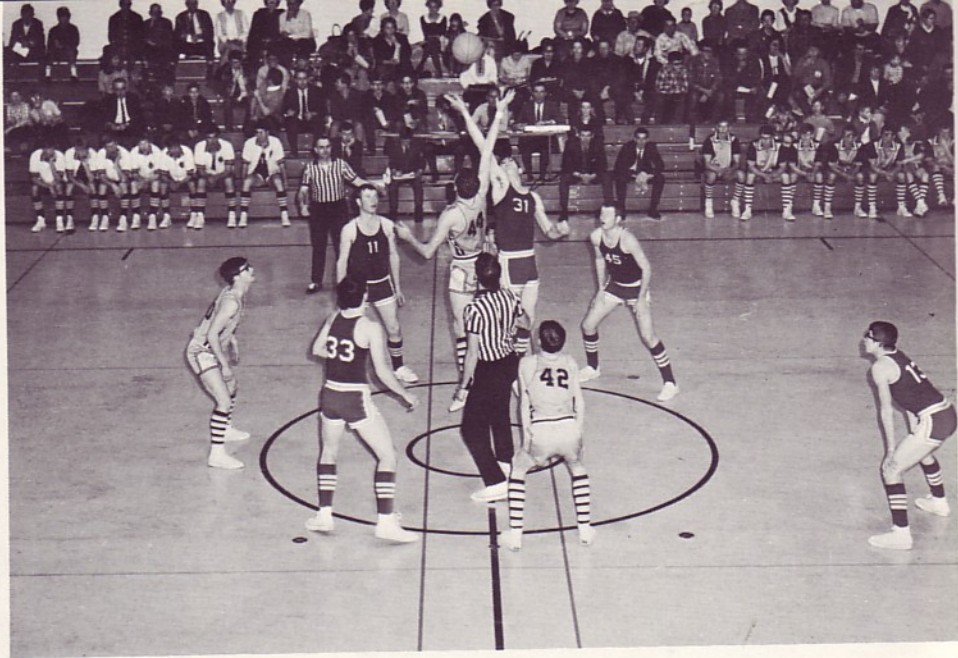

The Monarchs had a winning season for the fourth straight year, relying on a hustling, fast-break offense most of the winter, coupled with great rebounding strength off the boards. As usual, the Harrold games were heart-stoppers, two free throws by Massey at 1:07 and one by Welch at 0:09 winning the first one. Sevensing's 21 points and the fast break beat Ft. Pierre. BHS rebounded from a four-overtime loss to whip Highmore as Welch and Massey combined for 34 points and 31 rebounds. Probably the best performance of the season was the win over Stephan in the semifinals of the CPAC tourney as the team shot 60%, every player hit 50% or better, the free throw shooters made 21 of 30, Welch scored 22, and Massey made 21. All five starters accepted the championship trophy the next night. A win at Huron over Wessington and a win over SBA were followed by the first loss ever in the CPAC, a free throw with three seconds left causing it. The Monarchs scored 79 points against the Agar defense but still lost. The day after Massey ran his arm through the glass in the high school door, the team lost to #8 Tripp at Mitchell, Ogan getting 12 rebounds in his varsity debut. Blunt had only two starters left at the end of the second Harrold game, Kozel and Doyle scoring the winning points. When Massey returned, Sevensing was lost with a cracked wrist for two weeks. A loss to Ft. Pierre came on a last-second free shot, but Robbins got 17 in his first game as a starter. He had 23 against Onida two nights later as Blunt ended up 3-2 and third in the LCAC. Massey had 27 points and 15 rebounds before fouling out at 3:30 in a loss to Stephan, Blunt finishing 7-1 in the CPAC race. Welch had a high of 28 in the Wood game. In District 15, 16 of 20 free throws saved the day against Highmore. In the semifinals it was 19-2 for Onida at the quarter---enough said! Blunt won third place in a satisfying win over Ft. Pierre as Massey hit a high of 35 (23 in the second half) and Sevensing had 11 points and 12 assists. Welch and Massey were on the CPAC all-tourney team; they and Sevensing made the CPAC all-conference team for the all-star game.

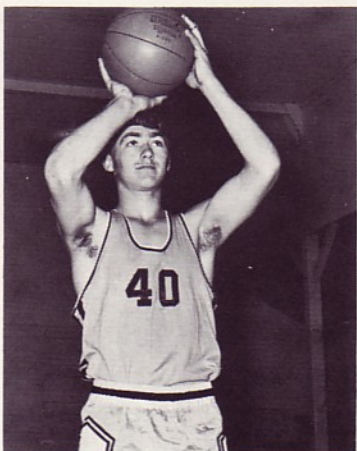
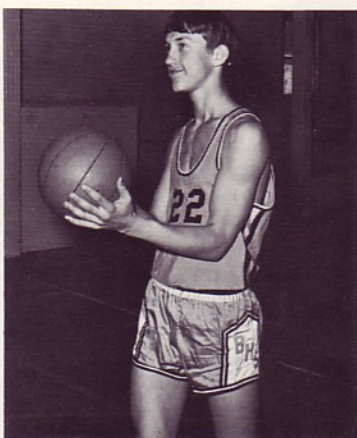
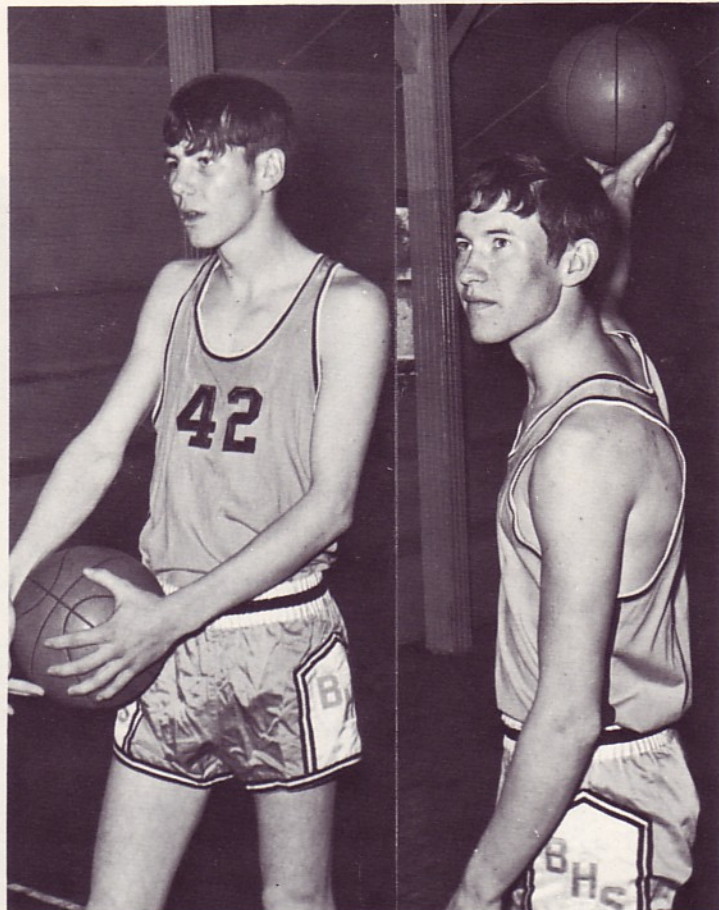

Rich Doyle (20 at left) was one of three Monarchs who played in all 23 games. Against Onida he found an opening and sneaked through for this shot. Above, Ted Massey jumps with Steve Hyde to start the second half with Doyle at left, Dewayne Robbins visible between the jumpers and Ed Welch (42) on this side. Below, three sophomores who saw plenty of varsity action are pictured. Mark Kozel (24 at left) gets off a shot over an outstretched Onida arm. Jerry Ogan (52) hit the starting lineup in the Agar game in January and started at forward frequently after that. He scored 75 points and played in all but two varsity games. Dewayne Robbins (22 at right) shows his "jumping jack" ability in the Onida game. He cracked the starting five in the Tripp game; his shooting and rebounding kept him there.





In the top row are the three senior regulars. Les Sevening (30) was the "quarterback" of the team at guard, the team's ball handler and fourth-highest scorer. His value was most obvious when he was injured in the second Harrold game and missed two weeks. Ed Welch (42) had 221 rebounds, a 16.1 point average, and the most free throws. His favorite spot was far out along the baseline; he was a dead-eye from there. Ed's biggest moment was the first game of the district when his 16 points in the last period and 2 overtimes led Blunt to victory. Ted Massey (upper right) led the team in rebounds (228), total points (410), and average (19.5). If figures were kept, he probably led in assists, too. He climaxed three years as a starter with 35 points in the third place game of the district. At left are four underclassmen who completed our "first seven." Jerry Ogan and Dewayne Robbins (top row) were two promising sophomores. Rich Doyle and Buddy King (bottom row) were two junior guards most of the year. King was third-highest scorer and played in all 23 games, and both of them had among the best free throw percentages.

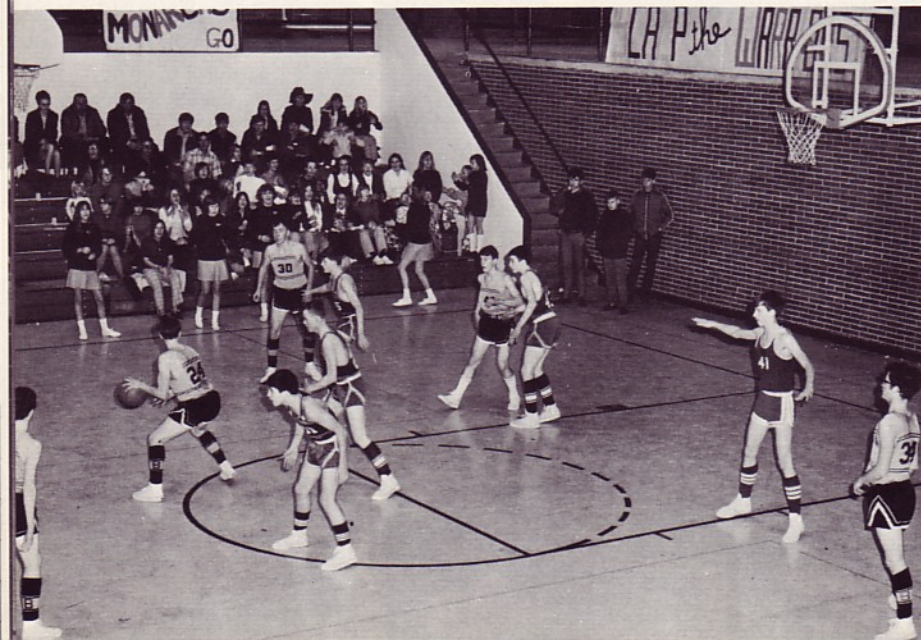

The Blunt B's rolled to five straight wins---a steal by Ping and a basket by Peterson won the SBA game and a layup by Kozel the first Harrold game---before losing at Highmore. One of their best games was a win over Stephan as Robbins got 17 rebounds. With a 7-1 record the team lost five of its last eight as Ogan and Robbins moved up to the varsity. The "game of the year!" was a 53-50 win over Onida as five points by Kozel, a jump by Ping, and two free throws by Goc with 0:17 to go clinched the exciting victory. The season record was 10-7.

And it was a "Super Soph" who received recognition from the faculty for her academic dedication ---Wanda Ping.



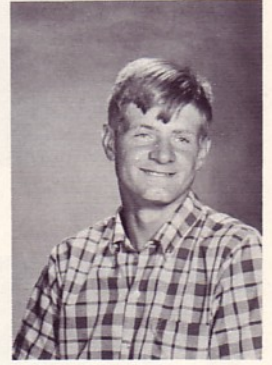

The 1970 season began with Blunt winning a quadrangular meet at Ft. Pierre as Kimbley and Sevening each scored 13 points. After a three-week weather lay-off BHS placed third in the LCAC meet although Kimbley was injured. Sevening had 15 points and Doyle 14. Following meets at White River and Mission the Monarchs finished second, nine points behind Sunshine Bible, in the CPAC meet as Sevening and Doyle each won three events. The Monarchs had eight placings in a twilight meet at Pierre as a warmup for the regional where Blunt captured fifth place with eight placings, including three each by Doyle and Sevening.

Rich Doyle and Les Sevening were Blunt's prominent point-getters in track this year. In the two top pictures Doyle is shown in action in the long jump and pole vault at the LCAC meet. Sevening in the lower photographs is shown winning his heat of the low hurdles and running a close race in the 220.

Doyle climaxed a brilliant year by qualifying for the state meet at Rapid City in the high jump, pole vault, and long jump. He tied his own school vault record of 10'3 and broke three CPAC marks. Robbins' specialties were the 100 and the long jump; he missed the state meet by two inches in the long jump. Kozel, a promising miler, was fourth in the CPAC mile and second in the 880 and also just missed qualifying at the regional. Kimbley had a terrific opening meet but missed the rest of the season because of a muscle pull, hurting Blunt's chances in every meet. Sevensing won the highs and lows in the CPAC and LCAC and the CPAC 100 and set a school record of :21.5 in the lows. He placed in three events at the regional and was edged from a state meet position by a whisker in the lows. Boyles was second in the lows and highs at the CPAC and third in the vault and placed at other meets. Other lettermen were Russ Spaid, Ed Welch, Ted Massey, Buddy King, Jerry Ogan, and Mike Jolley. Spaid, a weight man, won fourth in the LCAC shot. Welch was fifth in the CPAC long jump and ran on several relay teams. Massey ran on three relay teams at the CPAC meet, all finishing third. King was a two-miler, placing fourth at the CPAC. Ogan was a promising hurdler and got fifth in the lows and highs at the CPAC. Jolley placed fourth in the junior high shot at the CPAC event. The 880 team of Kimbley, Robbins, Sevensing, and Boyles was third in the regional meet.

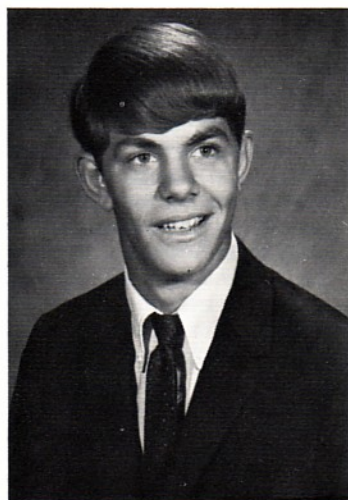


*Carlotta M. Albright*

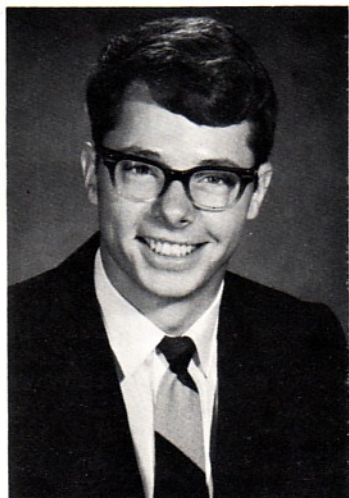


*Donald G. Kietzmann*

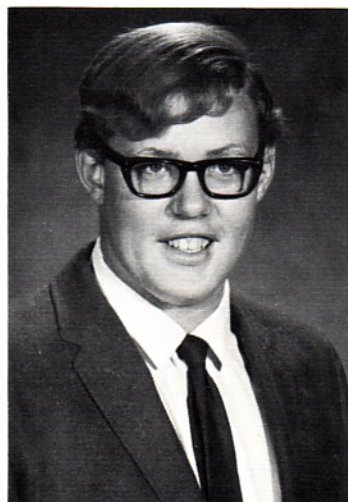
## Sandra K. Small
